## » Why Partner?

Education is a path to economic opportunity, but basic needs can stand in the way of success. United Way of King County is committed to breaking down these barriers and supporting students from early learning through postsecondary graduation. We believe income, ZIP code, and race shouldn't determine a student's future. Your partnership can help transform lives, strengthen our future workforce, and create a more equitable education system for all.

### EARLY LEARNING:

Through our **ParentChild+** program, in collaboration with 13 King County community partners, we help low-income, refugee, and immigrant families prepare their children for kindergarten. By fostering critical language and early literacy skills and strengthening parent-child relationships, we ensure kids enter the classroom ready to learn and thrive.

### HIGH SCHOOL GRADUATION:

We fund the **Racial Equity Coalition (REC)**, a group of 14 organizations of color that offer in- and out-of-school programs that celebrate the youth's cultural identities, nurture a love for community and learning, build leadership skills, and equip them with the tools to stay engaged and succeed in school.

### COLLEGE COMPLETION:

Over half of Washington college students report experiencing one or more forms of basic needs insecurity, according to a survey and report led by Western Washington University and the Washington Student Achievement Council (WSAC). With our **Bridge to Finish** program, we help community college students stay in school by connecting them to resources that make it easier to pay for tuition, housing, food, and emergencies. These services are available through Benefits Hubs, easily accessible centers on 10 campuses across King County. Bridge to Finish students are 25% more likely to persist or complete a credential than non-participants.

## ADVOCACY IN ACTION

We're not just addressing students' critical needs—we're advocating to transform the policies that create them. Our advocacy and partnership efforts successfully secured the inclusion of ParentChild+ in Seattle's FEPP Levy, advancing sustainable funding for this vital early learning program on the November 2025 ballot. The coalition we founded also successfully secured funding for benefit navigator positions at every public and tribal college to assist students in navigating public benefits and emergency resources.

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[Racial Equity Coalition (REC) programming] has done so much for us, especially with school supplies, homework help, forming groups that help students do their homework, leadership classes, drop-out prevention, and drug prevention.
